Creating a wiki with pbwiki.com

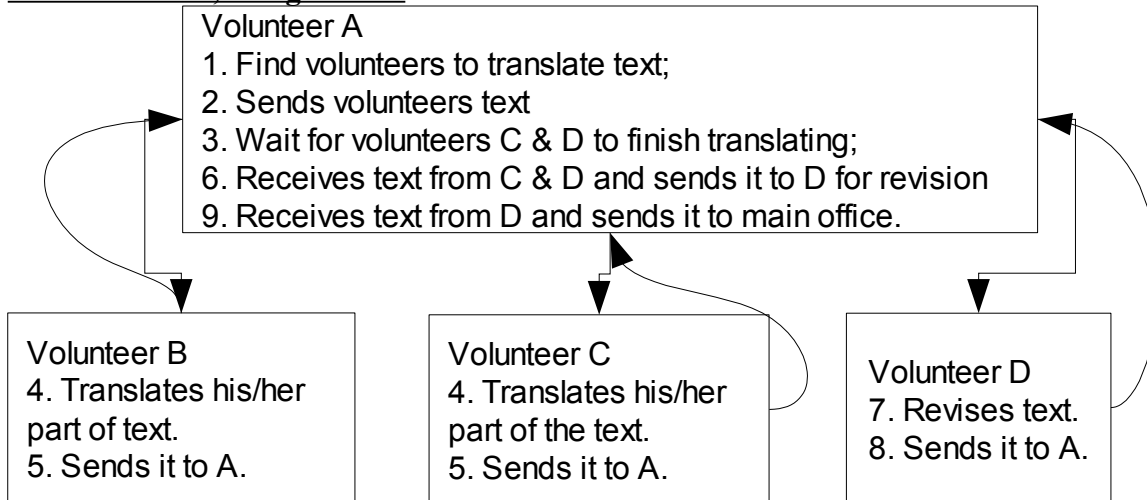
1. Go to pbwiki.com
2. Click on “create a wiki”
3. Indicate your site name, e-mail address and whether its for individual, commercial or educational purpose
4. Wait for the confirmation e-mail. Click on the approval link once you receive the e-mail.
5. On the password page:
 - a) Pick a password and re-type to confirm it
 - b) Decide if you want your wiki viewable by the public or not. Your pbwiki always require passwords to edit.
 - c) Agree to the terms of service.
 - d) Decide if you want a “Classic” editor or a “Point-and-Click” editor.
 - e) Click on “Next: choose wiki features”
6. On the “Upgrade Your Wiki!” page, scroll down to “Continue trying out the free version” and click “No thanks, just take me to my wiki”
7. Follow the instructions to make your first wiki edit!

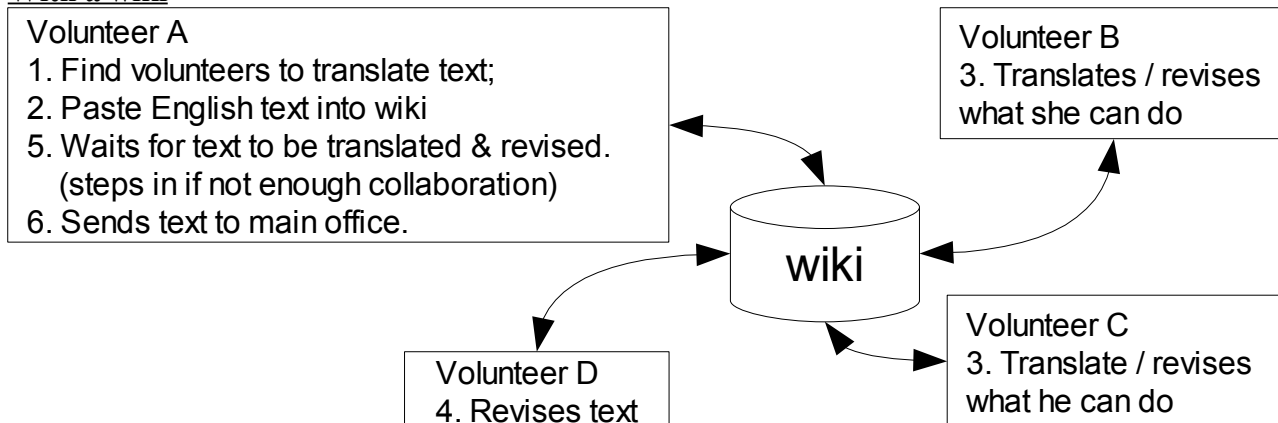

Advantages of using a wiki:

- No need for a volunteer to coordinate;
- Work is available immediately for revision, rather than waiting for it to be finished;
- Volunteers can revise the work of each other. More people revising the work;
- "Lower barriers to entry": volunteers can edit as much or as little as they want.

Some principles & practice to take into consideration:

- Be bold
- Edit with care: you do not want to lose your volunteers.
- Be prepared to be edited.
- Have a glossary of recurring terms.
- If possible, assign a bottom liner to make sure things get translated
